Gathering and Greeting – Rev Peter

The animals of God's creation inhabit the skies, the earth, and the sea.

They share in the fortunes of human existence and have a part in human life.

Meditative Story - Rev Tina

I invite you to return your childhood memories of pets and memories of running free in fields of long grass with butterflies and grasshoppers.

Prepare to listen to a story about a child and a bird, a child who lived on a lighthouse with her family. Close your eyes and try to imagine yourself as her sister or brother.

Its night and there's a storm outside, the wind is howling, the rain is hitting against the windowpanes and it's comforting to be inside a solid stone house.

Dad goes outside to check the lighthouse light is working properly. He's gone a long time.

Suddenly the back door slams. Dad still has his heavy coat and boots on when he walks into the warm kitchen, with its solid wood-fire oven and Mum makes a fuss about his muddy footprints.

Dad is holding a small black bird and says: It flew into the lighthouse. I think its wings are damaged.

Mum gets an old blue blanket and wraps it around the bird and gives it to us.

Tina holds it and looks at it. Lucy. Let's call her Lucy.

Lucy looks up at Tina and blinks her eyes.

Tina says: I think she likes me

Tina passes Lucy to you, and you say hello. She blinks her eyes again. She likes you too. Both of you put Lucy in a doll's pram for the night and mum puts a bit of netting over the top.

Mum says to Tina: Remember what happened with those penguins. I don't want to clean up more bird poop. Yes mum, says Tina.

Dad promises to make a cage the next day.

When we wake up in the morning Dad has a fish for Lucy and we spend the day feeding her more fish, cuddling her and carrying her all over the place. Dad builds the cage and explains to us that Lucy is a mutton bird and all her friends are migrating to a far away place.

When her cage is ready, we place her in the cage and every day we feed her fish. And whenever we can we bring her inside and cuddle her. Some days we notice when she's alone in her cage she seems sad and lonely and looks out of her cage towards the horizon.

Weeks go by and her wing gradually heals.

One day we know it's time to set her free and we take her out of her cage.

Come on Lucy. It's time for you to go and join your family. You can come back next summer.

We put her on the ground. We wanted her to know we were saying goodbye and setting her free.

Lucy looked up at us and just sat there.

Perhaps she was thinking: *How can I show them I love them?*

Lucy started running along the ground, faster and faster, flapping her wings up and down, until she nearly took off. Then she plonked back down on the ground on her bottom, with her feet in the air.

We called out: Try again Lucy.

Lucy started running again, flapping her wings faster and faster, until she's running very fast. Suddenly, she takes off and flies up into the air. Then she flies down and around us, then up again, then down and around us, letting out a long sorrowful call.

Lucy flies around us again. And again.

We knew she loved us and was saying thank you and goodbye.

We called out: Goodbye Lucy. We love you.

Lucy flew down again and around us and let out another long sorrowful call as if she was saying: *I love you*. Then Lucy flew up into the sky, towards the horizon and she kept on flying until we couldn't see her anymore

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This is a true story. I invite you to ponder on the times you have connected closely with an animal. We are God's creatures, and we need to remain connected with other creatures God has created.

I'd like to share some images with you and invite you to ponder and try to remember some of the places you've been in your lifetime that have left you feeling awe for God's beautiful creation.

Genesis 2:8 – 20

⁸Now the LORD God had planted a garden in the east, in Eden, and there he put the man he had formed. ⁹The LORD God made all kinds of trees grow out of the ground – trees that were pleasing

to the eye and good for food. In the middle of the garden were the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.

¹⁰ A river watering the garden flowed from Eden; from there it was separated into four headwaters. ¹¹ The name of the first is the Pishon; it winds through the entire land of Havilah, where there is gold. ¹² (The gold of that land is good; aromatic resin^[a] and onyx are also there.) ¹³ The name of the second river is the Gihon; it winds through the entire land of Cush. ^[b] ¹⁴ The name of the third river is the Tigris; it runs along the east side of Ashur. And the fourth river is the Euphrates. ¹⁵ The LORD God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it. ¹⁶ And the LORD God commanded the man, "You are free to eat from any tree in the garden; ¹⁷ but you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for when you eat from it you will certainly die."

¹⁸ The LORD God said, "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a helper suitable for him."

¹⁹ Now the LORD God had formed out of the ground all the wild animals and all the birds in the sky. He brought them to the man to see what he would name them; and whatever the man called each living creature, that was its name. ²⁰ So the man gave names to all the livestock, the birds in the sky and all the wild animals. But for Adam^[c] no suitable helper was found. (NIV)

Sermon-Rev Pete

Genesis 2:15-20

¹⁵ The LORD God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it. ¹⁶ And the LORD God commanded the man, "You are free to eat from any tree in the garden; ¹⁷ but you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for when you eat from it you will certainly die."

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In Jewish tradition naming something is not merely the act of giving something a title for identification. Take Joseph in the birth narrative of Jesus for example. When Joseph names Jesus as his child, it does more than just become his name, Jesus and therefore Mary, become the responsibility of Joseph. They are named into his household.

In this Genesis account Adam (or Adem translated as Earth-Creature with a good debate on gender) names the animals. If we carry on this understanding of household responsibility, then each creature named becomes the responsibility of Adam.

The Jewish laws of Kosher eating also reflect the responsibility for animals. One of the laws of Kosher food is that the animal must not have suffered prior to slaughter. In fact, even the slaughter is to have been done in a way that gives dignity and gratitude to the animal. The whole life of the animal is to have been kosher. This law then causes even the eating of a meal to become a deep spiritual event that recognises the journey to the plate.

If we as Christians recognise that our roots are within the Jewish understanding of animal naming, what does it say to us in our modern context of climate change, of habitat destruction and even the planting of our gardens?

As we name and bless our pets, our challenge is to extend that blessing to all creation. Far easier said and prayed for than done. But each meditation and blessing with and for our pets takes us one step closer to that heavenly image of the Garden of Eden.
